PRESENT: The Town Mayor Cllr Caroline Byles, Charles Flatman (District Cllr), Guy McGregor (County Cllr) together with 9 Town Cllrs, the Town Clerk and 36 members of the public - as per attendance sheet.

1. TOWN MAYOR WELCOME TO THOSE PRESENT

In opening the meeting, the Town Mayor, Cllr Caroline Byles welcomed those present to the Annual Town Meeting and thanked everyone for their attendance. She explained that new audio and visual equipment, purchased with a lottery grant, was set up to make the meeting more accessible to all.

2. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Apologies were received from Cllrs Nancy Ford, Andrew Evitt, Alan Cooper and Charlotte McAuslan

3. MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING - (13th May 2014)

An amendment to the minutes of the previous meeting on page 2-item number 10 was proposed, being that the number of the bus should read 113. With this amendment, acceptance of the minutes was proposed by Cllr Peter Gould and seconded by Cllr Richard Berry and agreed.

5. MAYORS REPORT

Cllr C Byles gave a report on her year as Mayor and gave an overview of achievements and events. She thanked all those that had supported her during her busy year. A synopsis of her report was printed in the annual newsletter and is available on the Town Council web pages

6. CIVIC AWARDS FOR 2014

The Mayor presented the annual Civic Awards to :-

- · Graham and Ann West for their contributions to running the Community Centre
- · Julie Shepherd for her work at the Eye Library
- Michael Barr for his voluntary work in maintaining the Eye playing fields.
- Brett Fraser for his contributions relating to town events, management of the town Facebook site and involvement with the business forum.

The Mayor also presented certificates to Cllr Linda Cummins, Cllr Merlin Carr and Cllr Georgia Horobin who stood down as Town Councillors, and thanked them for their dedication and service to the town.


7. POLICE REPORT

Police Community Support Officer Dave Faulkner advised that between 02.04.13 and 09.05.14, 118 crimes had been reported and of these, 91 crimes occurred between 09.05.13 and 09.05.14. During the past year, between 09.05.14 and 09.05.15 there were 81 crimes reported to the police. PCSO Faulkner advised that these statistics showed a reduction in crime for another year running. He announced that the Police and Crime Commissioner, Tim Passmore, will be asking council taxpayers to pay an average 6p a week extra towards policing in the county in the next financial year. He stated that current police priorities are burglaries and thefts from outside areas.

8. REPORT BY COUNTY COUNCILLOR. GUY MCGREGOR

County Cllr Guy McGregor was pleased to report there had been no increase in the County Council's proportion of the Council Tax in the coming year. Guy also gave the good news that Hartismere School received another outstanding report from OFSTED and continued to be oversubscribed because of its

reputation as one of the leading schools in the region. He stated that the future of Eye's Children's Centre was secured after a recent review confirmed that this was a busy centre providing relevant services to the community.

On another matter he said that the building of the Care Home on Castleton Way, which will replace Paddock House, has been progressing steadily and will be completed later this year. Cllr McGregor hopes that when the old Paddock house site is developed it will include the building of a new library.

On development matters Cllr McGregor explained that he has been working to secure the delivery of more health services on the Hartismere Hospital site and has been involving Ben Gummer MP for Ipswich and Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Quality at Department of Health, in discussions. On the controversial subject of the Progress Power Plant Cllr McGregor said that the County Council had objected to the plans on the basis of the location of the compound, currently earmarked for Yaxley. A decision as to whether or not to grant Development Consent Orders to the project is expected from the Secretary of State for Energy and Climate Change in mid-July 2015.

Finally Cllr McGregor reiterated that the provision of superfast broadband remains a priority for Suffolk County Council and Eye residents can look forward to this service being available in 2015.

Residents asked Cllr McGregor about the 20-mile an hour speed limit in the conservation area and traffic concerns in Magdalen Street. Cllr McGregor said he hoped there would be some progress on these issues after some recent changes at the County Council.

9. REPORT BY DISTRICT COUNCILLOR. CHARLES FLATMAN

Cllr Flatman reported that Mid Suffolk had made a small increase in the precept for the coming year. Cllr Flatman explained that Mid Suffolk were successful in applying for funding from the Government's £84m Right to Buy Social Mobility Fund, which was launched earlier this year. The scheme enables local authorities to make one-off payments to council tenants of up to £20k as a cash incentive to buy a property for the first time. This two-year funding opportunity is aimed at those who are eligible for the "right to buy scheme" and wish to buy a property on the open market. Cllr Flatman also shared his views on the housing development proposed for the Eye Airfield site saying he thought 100 homes would be adequate with the right infrastructure.

On the controversial subject of the Progress Power Plant District Councillor Flatman said that he and Mid-Suffolk had objected to the development. Cllr Flatman expressed reservations about the Power Plant as he thought smaller businesses located on the airfield site would provide better employment opportunities for local people.

Cllr Flatman spoke passionately about illegal drugs and the negative effects on people's lives and he said he continued to support the efforts by police and other organisations to tackle drug use.

11. REPORT AND ACCOUNTS OF EYE TOWN COUNCIL

Cllr Simon Hooton gave an overview of the finances for the year. In his report he highlighted that the miscellaneous income for the Town Council had been increased by £49,000 due to a number of grants received including amounts for the Town Hall heating project, equipment in the Town Hall, town events, the neighbourhood plan and a refund of rates for the public toilet. He stated that the increase in expenditure related to the external grants received by the Council, such as expenditure and refund of a

proportion of the neighbourhood grant, town events and Christmas lights, a feasibility study relating to relocating the library to premises in Cross Street, and equipment for the Town Hall. He also reported that there had also been an increase in the wages bills due to changes in hours and arrangements of holiday cover for staff. Cllr Hooton reported that the Council had invested in financial software that will make financial reporting easier.
